UNIVERSITY AND CITY INTRODUCTION:

Boise State University:

Founded in 1932 and with [more than 26,000 students](#), Boise State University (BSU) is the largest institution of higher education in the state of Idaho. BSU offers 112 undergraduate degrees and 100 graduate degrees and certificates. The university has been ranked by U.S. News and World Report as one of the most innovative universities in the United States.

The **Intensive English Program (IEP)** at BSU is accredited by the Northwest Commission of Colleges and Universities (NCCU) and is a member of English USA. The mission of the IEP at BSU is to provide English learning opportunities to students for personal enrichment, professional development, and/or academic success. The IEP also offers custom-designed programs of varying lengths and specializations.

Boise, Idaho:

Boise is the capital city of Idaho with over 750,000 people in the metropolitan area. Boise offers the benefits of a big city and the safety and friendliness of a small town. One of the fastest-growing cities in the U.S., Boise has been ranked the #1 most livable city in the country by

livability.com. Students love that Boise State is within easy walking distance to downtown restaurants, pubs, museums, and cultural activities as well as to expansive city parks and the 40-kilometer greenbelt trail system located on both sides of the Boise River. Boise has four distinct seasons; each season brings many different types of activities and events that our students enjoy.

PROGRAM INTRODUCTION:

Summer at Boise State University: Summer on the BSU campus is a little different than during the school year. The university offers fewer activities, but the city of Boise is vibrant with many fun things to do. We recommend renting a bicycle to explore free concerts, city parks, the Boise River, cafés, and more!

Summer Housing & Dining: Summer housing is typically on campus. Accommodations are usually a private bedroom with shared living spaces. Some residences have a kitchen and others have a shared community kitchen on the same floor. All kitchens are minimally supplied, so students will need to purchase a few basic cooking & eating items. Campus dining options are not guaranteed to be open, and may have limited hours. For summer 2024, students were able to buy meal tickets that covered approximately 1/2 to 1/3 of meals. We hope to have a similar option in 2025. Supermarkets are a 15-25 minute walk.

Cultural Experiences: IEP students are invited and encouraged to attend a variety of social and extracurricular activities at minimal or no cost. We send weekly suggestions to students.

Examples include:

- weekly conversation events with Boise State students (no cost);
- join the Recreation Center (gym) on campus (2024 cost: \$45/month);
- rent a bicycle (2024 cost was \$85 for the entire month) to explore beyond campus;
- find free (or low-cost) Boise events in downtown and city parks. There are free concerts, farmer's markets, movies, museums, and more!;
- watch a Boise Hawks baseball game (30 minutes on bicycle or take a rideshare);
- rent a tube or raft and "float" the Boise River;
- attend the annual Independence Day celebration in the park (July 4);
- and weekly on-campus social events when available (no fees or minimal fees).

Summer Course Offerings: We typically offer three general English subjects: Reading and Writing (8 hours per week); Communication (7 hours per week) and Grammar (3 hours per week). In the summer, we often substitute an "Integrated Skills" class where students engage with the Boise community and practice their English skills in real-life contexts.

Reading and Writing: Depending on proficiency level, students practice sentences, paragraphs, personal essays, short creative writing, and research essays. Students read various items from simplified texts at the beginner level to a variety of genres and academic-level texts and articles in the upper levels.

Communication: Students at all levels build confidence and proficiency in conversational English, presentations, interviews, listening skills, and strategies for comprehension. Native English speakers from BSU often volunteer as conversation partners in Communication classes.

Integrated Skills & Experiential Learning: Students learn a combination of core language skills—vocabulary, idioms, speaking, listening, grammar, writing, etc.—through exploring different topics. They apply these new language skills during experiential learning opportunities outside of the traditional classroom environment during our community-based fieldwork and tours.

Special Programs: The IEP can offer subject-specific language training and events (lectures/visits) for groups of students from similar disciplines and with similar English levels. Minimum group size: 10. Prices vary.

English Proficiency Requirements: The IEP has no English test requirement; however, we do require a basic understanding of English. All students must complete our online testing (remote) about one month before classes for proper class-level placement.

Class Levels: We offer classes from beginning to advanced levels at most times of the year. We offer up to five levels per session. When student numbers are lower, however, we may offer fewer levels and/or blended levels.

Lesson Times and Days of the Week: Full-time students receive 18 hours of general English each week. Attendees with an ESTA visa waiver or B-2 study part-time (fewer than 18 hours). Courses usually run between 8:30 – 16:00 Mondays through Fridays. Students can expect between 6-8 hours of additional, self-directed study per week (homework).

HOW TO APPLY:

Students must complete the online application process [HERE](#).

After students complete the online application process, the IEP will email an acceptance letter directly to the student (and an I-20 if applying for a student visa [F-1]).

Admission Requirements:

- Students must:
 - be 16 years of age or older. Students in housing must be at least 18.
 - have a basic understanding of the English language.
 - complete the [online application](#) for F-1 students, F-1 working with an agent, or Other Visas for B-2 or ESTA applicants
 - Upload a passport copy of the identity page of their passport;
 - Pay the \$100 non-refundable application fee (\$50 for B-2/ESTA);
 - Complete the English proficiency written task.
 - If application is for an F-1, provide an [official financial support statement](#) from their bank, sponsor, or guardian certifying that they have sufficient funds available for their studies at Boise State University;

Type of Visa: All sixteen-week students must come on an F-1 Student Visa. Four-week and eight-week students can choose to participate in full-time study with an F-1 Visa. They can also come to Boise on a tourist visa or ESTA visa waiver, but they will only be able to study part time (17 hours or fewer per week).

All admissions questions should be directed to iepinfo@boisestate.edu.

OTHER DETAILS:

Arrivals: Our campus is a short, ten-minute ride from the airport. We ask that students take a taxi or ride-share service from the Boise airport to our office. Once the students arrive at our office, we help them move into their dormitory. There is no service fee for this. We will email helpful instructions to the students. Students must arrive on campus between 8:00 and 19:00 (8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.). Students arriving later should get a hotel room for the night and arrive on campus the next morning.

Airport Drop-Off: We do not offer an airport drop-off service. Boise is small and easy to navigate. It is easy for students to arrange a ride-share service or taxi to the airport.

Accommodation: The IEP will arrange housing for partner university students. Living accommodations are typically a single bedroom in a four-bedroom on-campus dormitory or a shared bedroom in a two-bedroom, off-campus apartment. Housing choices depend upon availability.

Accommodation Cost: \$40 per night (estimated) + a one-time \$125 housing placement fee + a one-time \$20-\$45 bedding rental (for on-campus dormitories). Summer rates are often lower than during the school year. Off-campus housing rates are based on double room occupancy (two students per bedroom; each student has a separate bed).

Accommodation Facilities: Basic bedding is supplied for a \$20-\$45 rental fee. Students may want to supplement with extra pillows or blankets. Furniture in the bedrooms includes a bed, a closet, a desk, and a chair. The kitchens (in the residences or on the same floor, depending on availability) have seating and basic appliances, but kitchens are minimally supplied, so students will need to purchase a few basic cooking & eating items. Living rooms have a sofa, chair, and table. Laundry facilities (washer/dryer) are available in the suite or building. Students usually share a bathroom with one other student. WIFI and utilities are included.

Meals: Meal plans are typically not available during the summer term. As the dormitories (rooms or buildings) have complete and fully functional kitchens, most students choose to cook in the common kitchen and eat with their roommates. (Some summer residences have a shared community kitchen on the same floor). Campus dining options are not guaranteed to be open, and may have limited hours. For summer 2024, students were able to buy meal tickets that covered approximately 1/2 to 1/3 of meals. We hope to have a similar option in 2025. Supermarkets are a 15-25 minute walk.

Food Budget: We suggest a daily allowance of between \$10 - \$20. Students pay for their food independently.

Transportation to and from classes: Walking, bicycling, or the bus. All residences are within easy walking distance. As BSU students, students can take public transportation at no charge. If students live on campus, their classes are a five-minute walk. If they live off campus, it is a 30 to 40-minute walk. Some students purchase or rent a bicycle.

Insurance: International students (F-1 visa) studying at Boise State University’s Intensive English Program (IEP) are required to have health insurance that meets university requirements. The health insurance policy must:

- Have a policy written in English.
- Cover the cost of repatriation.
- Cover the cost of medication evacuation.

Students must show proof of insurance to participate in any programming at the Intensive English Program.

On-Campus Recreation Center: Boise State has a wonderful gym, [The Recreation Center](#), on campus with a wide variety of services. IEP students can join the “Rec” Center per month or per semester ([click for current membership fees](#)).

PROGRAM INTRODUCTION:

Course Offerings: We typically offer three general English subjects: Reading and Writing (8 hours per week); Communication (7 hours per week); and Grammar (3 hours per week). Course offerings may differ in the summer or to accommodate specific groups (like ESTA).

Reading and Writing: Students in the beginner level of our reading and writing and grammar courses master sentence and paragraph structure and read simplified text. At the intermediate level, they become proficient in writing personal essays and short creative pieces and read mainstream news articles, online content, and essays. At the advanced level, students conduct academic research, completing multi-sourced essays in a variety of genres and reading academic texts and articles.

Communication: Beginning-level students gain confidence and proficiency in conversational English. By the intermediate level, they are engaging in discussions requiring specialized vocabulary and grammatical structures, and by the advanced level they can engage in abstract and academic discussions. At all levels, the students give academic presentations, participate in interviews, and develop listening skills and strategies for comprehension. Native English speakers from BSU often volunteer as conversation partners in Communication classes.

ESTA attendees: students attending with an ESTA or B-2 visa will generally take Reading & Writing, Communication, and a special topics course.

Special Programs: The IEP can offer courses involving partial day English classes complemented by subject-specific language training and events (lectures/visits) for groups of students from similar disciplines. To offer these specialized programs, there is a minimum group size of 10 students with similar English proficiency levels. Prices vary.

English Proficiency Requirements: The IEP has no English test requirement; however we do require a basic understanding of English. We request that students complete our online testing (remote) about one month before classes for proper class-level placement.

Class Levels: We offer classes from beginning to advanced levels at most times of the year. We offer up to five levels per session. When student numbers are lower, however, we may offer fewer levels and/or blended levels.

Lesson Times and Days of the Week: Full-time students receive 18 hours of general English each week. Courses usually run between 8:30 – 16:00 Mondays through Fridays. Students can expect between 6-8 hours of additional, self-directed study per week (homework).

Minimum and maximum of students to be recruited:

There is no minimum number of students to be recruited for our general program. If a partner university would like us to offer a customized program or a special topics class for the group, we require a minimum of ten students.

We do not have an established maximum level of students.

Cultural Experiences:

IEP students are invited and encouraged to attend a variety of social and extracurricular activities at minimal or no cost.

Examples include:

- Coffee and Conversation events with Boise State students (no cost);
- regularly offered outdoor adventures with the Boise State Outdoor Program such as skiing, snowshoeing, rafting, backpacking, and biking trips (minimal fees);
- regularly scheduled career readiness and academic support workshops (no fees);
- and weekly on-campus social and sporting events (no fees or minimal fees).

HOW TO APPLY:

Students must complete the online application process [HERE](#).

After students complete the online application process, the IEP will email an I-20 and acceptance letter directly to the student.

Admission Requirements:

- Students must:
 - be 16 years of age or older. Students in housing must be at least 18.
 - have a basic understanding of the English language.
 - complete the [online application](#) for F-1 students, F-1 working with an agent, or Other Visas for B-2 or ESTA applicants
 - Upload a passport copy of the identity page of their passport, showing their photo and full name;
 - Pay the \$100 non-refundable application fee (\$50 for B-2/ESTA);
 - If application is for an F-1, provide and [official financial support statement](#) from their bank, sponsor, or guardian certifying that they have sufficient funds available for their studies at Boise State University;
 - Complete the English proficiency written task.

Type of Visa: All sixteen-week students must come on an F-1 Student Visa. Four-week and eight-week students can choose to participate in full-time study with an F-1 Visa. They can also come to Boise on a tourist visa or ESTA visa waiver, but they will only be able to study part time (17 hours or fewer per week).

OTHER DETAILS:

Arrivals: Our campus is a short, ten-minute ride from the airport. We ask that students take a taxi or ride-share service from the Boise airport to our office. Once the students arrive at our office, we help them move into their dormitory. There is no service fee for this. We will email helpful instructions to the students. Students must arrive on campus between 8:00 and 19:00 (8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.). Students arriving later should get a hotel room for the night and arrive on campus the next morning.

Airport Drop-Off: We do not offer an airport drop-off service. Boise is small and easy to navigate. It is easy for students to arrange a ride-share service or taxi to the airport.

Accommodation: The IEP will arrange housing for partner university students. Living accommodations are typically a single bedroom in a four-bedroom on-campus dormitory or a shared bedroom in a two-bedroom, off-campus apartment. Housing choices depend upon availability. The earlier the application, the more choices there may be.

Accommodation Cost: \$40 per night (estimated) + a one-time \$125 housing placement fee + a one-time \$20-\$45 bedding rental (for on-campus dormitories). Off-campus housing rates are based on double room occupancy (two students per bedroom).

Accommodation Facilities: Basic bedding is supplied for a \$20-45 rental fee. Students may want to supplement with extra pillows or blankets. Furniture in the bedrooms includes a bed, a closet, a desk, and a chair. The kitchens have seating and basic appliances, but kitchens are minimally supplied, so students will need to purchase a few basic cooking & eating items. Living rooms have a sofa, chair, and table. Laundry facilities (washer/dryer) are available in the suite or building. Students usually share a bathroom with one other student. WIFI and utilities are included. Off-campus housing is a fully furnished apartment with two beds per room. Kitchens are well supplied with items for cooking and eating. Rates are based on double occupancy (2 people share one bedroom/separate beds). Example of a furnished off-campus apartment: [River Quarry Apartments](#)

Meals: During the academic year, students can purchase meal plans at the local cafeteria on campus ([Boise State Meal Plans](#)). Meal plans are not available during the summer term. As the dormitories have complete and fully functional kitchens, most students choose to cook in the common kitchen and eat with their roommates. (Some summer residences have a shared community kitchen on the same floor).

Food Budget: We suggest a daily allowance of between \$10 - \$20. Students pay for their food independently.

Transportation to and from classes: Walking, bicycling, or the bus. All residences are within easy walking distance. As BSU students, students can take public transportation at no charge. If students live on campus, their classes are a five-minute walk. If they live off campus, it is a 30 to 40-minute walk. Some students purchase or rent a bicycle.

Insurance: International students (F-1 visa) studying at Boise State University's Intensive English Program (IEP) are required to have health insurance that meets university requirements. The health insurance policy must:

- Have a policy written in English.
- Cover the cost of repatriation.
- Cover the cost of medication evacuation.

Students must show proof of insurance to participate in any programming at the Intensive English Program.

On-Campus Recreation Center: Boise State has a wonderful gym, [The Recreation Center](#), on campus with a wide variety of services. IEP students can join the "Rec" Center per month or per semester ([click for current membership fees](#)).
